As I end the third year as the District's Superintendent I am taking this opportunity to update all of you on phase three and four of the \$9.5 million bond project.

Bond Proposal Updates:

The school district has been very busy the past 14 months planning, reviewing construction options and drawings, accepting bids, and implementing changes within the district. All as a result of the successful bond proposal passing on February 26, 2013.

The district has recently completed phases one and two of the bond construction. These two phases centered on district technology upgrades as well as some safety and energy enhancements, as outlined in the Fall 2013 newsletter. Work on phases three and four will begin in March 2014 and be completed for the most part by October 2015. The bids for the phase three work have been awarded to date and the phase four bids will be awarded by the end of April 2014.

The district is happy to report that at this stage of project development and bid awards, the entire bond proposal budget is within its target ranges and a contingency fund of over \$400,000 is still available to help cover any unforeseen construction obstacles.

Major Concentrations of Phase Three: Fall of 2014 Completion:

- New roofs at North Elementary and the high school.
- New and separate heating systems for the high school, East Elementary School, administration, industrial arts building & high school gym area.
- Upgraded exterior and interior lighting in all buildings.
- New "buzz in" security system at all buildings.
- New and additional security cameras in all buildings.
- Moving the high school offices from "C" to "B" Floor.
- Classroom refinements on "B" and "C" floor of the high school.
- Installing additional bathrooms on "C" floor of the high school.
- Installing additional electronic and data outlets as well as additional Apple TV's and technology in various district classrooms.
- Renovation of the high school gym locker rooms and public restrooms.

Major Concentrations of Phase Four: Fall of 2015 Completion:

- Renovation of the high school Auditorium, including the installation of the 376 alumni seats that have already been purchased.
- Renovation of the high school Media Center.
- Major renovations to the high school science department. New science labs and classroom lecture spaces will be added to all three science classrooms.
- Major renovations and relocation of the high school English department classrooms.
- Renovations to various high school classrooms, hallways, and stairwells. Furthermore, all
 buildings will undergo enhancements in the areas of new paint, new classroom furnishings,
 and various new technology enhancements.


In closing, I am confidant that once Phase Four of the bond work is completed in the Fall of 2015, all staff members, students, and visitors of the Iron Mountain Publix School District will enjoy the benefits and comforts of the work. All of our school district buildings will have enhanced school safety and security systems. In addition, our schools will have 21st century technology, enhanced classroom learning environments and state of the art efficiency operations for our current and future generations.

The Last Romantic War


Idolo Anthony Gianunzio, IMHS Class of 1940 is a published author.

IMPS Continues To Give Back

Denim Days

Denim Days continue to be a success at Iron Mountain Public Schools. Each month the staff at IMPS contributes \$5 to wear jeans to school for a day. Money collected each month is donated to charity.
