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

Best Wishes On Your Retirement Mr. Chartier!

It is with deep appreciation and gratitude that we extend a fond farewell to our superintendent, Mr. Denny Chartier. Mr. Chartier is retiring at the end of the 2008-09 school year after serving in the field of education for thirty years.

A 1976 graduate of Iron Mountain High School, Denny was a stand-out athlete on the football field and on the basketball court for the Mountaineers.



He went on to Northern Michigan University where he received his undergraduate degree and then to the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point where he earned a master of arts. He began his career as a physical education instructor for the Rosholt Public Schools in Rosholt, Wisconsin. In addition, he was named athletic director and head coach for the Rosholt Hornets' football and basketball teams.

His dream became a reality in 1988 when he was hired by the Iron Mountain Public Schools as the new assistant principal/athletic director. In 1994 he was named Iron Mountain High School principal. The following year Denny was selected as the new superintendent of the Iron Mountain Public Schools. At that time he was

one of the youngest superintendents in the state of Michigan at age 37.

Denny's list of accomplishments throughout his tenure at our school is very impressive. His strong skills in leadership and his high energy work ethic are traits that formed a solid foundation that would not relent for fourteen years. He has been successful at implementing many new programs. He initiated a drug and alcohol awareness program with his association with our local law officials. He initiated a monthly radio show featuring the discussion of educational concerns with area superintendents. He helped develop our school television channel with the support of Charter Communications. Denny expanded our students' extra curricular activities and Advanced Placement courses. He helped with the formation of an athletic co-op program with Kingsford High School for sports such as swimming, hockey, and cross country.

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Although nearly 100 years old, our high school continues to be structurally sound. With Denny's foresight, nearly all the rooms have been updated and renovated throughout the school. Our athletic facilities are second to none. The renovations to our gymnasium and Mountaineer stadium are the envy of many opponents when they come to play on our turf. The opening of the "jewel" of our school, the Izzo Mariucci Center, was one of Denny's proudest moments. He, his committee, Tom Izzo and Steve Mariucci worked on fundraisers for ten years to make it become a reality.

Our grounds reflect careful planning and maintenance through Denny's association with private donors and members of the Lilja Fund for Beautification. He also lauds the efforts of the Academic Booster Club which supported the planting of flowering crab trees in the front of our high school building.

The Iron Mountain High School scholarship program has received state recognition for its growth. In his fourteen years as superintendent Denny has helped triple the scholarship trust to over four million dollars. Countless students have benefited from these available funds over the years.

Public awareness of our district with a strong Mountaineer tradition has been a top priority for Denny. He has made numerous presentations throughout Michigan promoting our district at state conferences and also at Central Michigan University to graduates who were going into the field of administration. He exudes 'Mountaineer Pride' and makes sure to promote and help

with the growth of our school in many unseen ways. It is not uncommon to see Denny taking class reunion groups on tours of our schools during the summer months. He was also instrumental in the development and publication of this newsletter.

Through careful planning and tough financial decision making, the overall condition of our school is sound and secure as we approach some very difficult times. Mr. Chartier has always found ways to make the necessary cuts yet maintain programs to help provide a first-class education for our students. Whether it has been academics, athletics or the arts, Denny always seeks quality at every level. His commitment to our school and community is reflected in everything he does. Our district has made steady progress in improving the overall quality of every facet of education and meeting students' needs under his leadership. He has based his decisions on "always doing what is best for kids". Our board of education has consistently awarded him outstanding ratings for his management position. Our schools have continually received an "A" rating through the assessment from the state of Michigan. He and his staff have also received numerous MASB Educational Excellence Awards.



Denny is married to the former Debra Doney, a 1970 graduate and recently retired IMHS teacher. His son Tyler graduated from IMHS in 2006 and is a junior at Michigan State University. Retirement plans include living in a warmer climate during the winter, playing plenty of golf, enjoying summer gardening and autumn deer hunting here in the U.P.

Interesting Board Minutes From The Past

April 30th, 1894: Miss Minnie MacDonald be employed as a substitute teacher at the salary of \$2.00 per day.

December 21, 1906: Secretary be authorized to make arrangements with the Livery Men in the city who will do the work the cheapest to carry teachers at the Chapin and Farragut from the buildings to their respective boarding houses.

June 19, 1908: Moved that the Board of Education request the City Council to appoint the school janitors "Special Policemen" without pay so they may better protect the school property.

December 17, 1897: Resolved: that all teachers be and are hereby requested to refrain from attending dancing parties and other social entertainments held upon evenings preceding days upon which school is in session.

September 16, 1910: Tuition for high school students-\$30.00 per year; Tuition for elementary students-\$5.00 per year.

November 18, 1910: When the principals consider the weather too inclement for outdoor recess, the usual 5 minute drill of calisthenics shall be given with the windows open.

March 19, 1915: Several students appeared before the Board and acknowledged they violated the rules of the school by bringing into the classroom paper toweling instead of the usual stationary, some of which was used for their test papers. Whereupon it was voted that those implicated be suspended for 30 days.



Thank you so much for sending me your publications. It is great that there are people like you and your group who not only have great ideas but carry them out.

I graduated from IMHS in 1942 and was from Homestead, WI, just seven miles away. Few people knew where that was since we had no high school, for years everyone went to Kingsford or Iron Mountain. Half of my family went to Kingsford but my Dad back then felt Iron Mountain High School was more refined and that was where I must go. It was years later that a new Kingsford High School superintendent realized they weren't getting state aid for all these Aurora and Homestead students from either State of Michigan or Wisconsin, so consequently, everyone had to go to Florence High School from then on, in their own county. However, Aurora and Homestead Township did pay our tuition.

It was a good choice and I, a little farm girl, was readily accepted. My three years at IMHS were most enjoyable. It seems my fondest memories were the Junior Proms, the Senior Hops and the formal Christmas dances at the Country Club and the Elks. Then there were the weekly Friday night dances at the K.C.'s with a live band. You just didn't miss them. My older sister Ione graduated in 1937 and brother Robert in 1939, also from IMHS.

We have always been thankful that Iron Mountain (and Kingsford) afforded us the opportunity to attend your high school and in appreciation, I enclose a check.

We moves to Escanaba 52 years ago when my husband, Harold Johnson, was hired as the head basketball coach, teacher and later administrator so I have always been aware of and interested in U.P. Sports and activities. I was the Delta County Circuit Reporter for many years and we have been retired 22 years.
